ake funk. Serve up some high-end bar food. Welcome anyone 21 to 71. Mix in some photography, obscure videos, and then blend them all in a dark bar with a crowd that's a mishmash of cool, trendy, yuppie and artsy, and you get the Innjoy.
The mix could be a bad formula, but at

this Wicker Park bar it creates a kaleido-scope that combines styles and bends genres to produce a mix that's exactly what owner and manager Rich Kewitz wanted.

His goal was to reflect the North Side neighborhood's eclectic makeup.

"We've got young professionals, artists,

some old residents, different races, different tastes, just a lot of different people," Kewitz said. "We wanted to reflect that and attract them all."

He kept the clear glass windows that allow passers-by to peek inside. And now the deep beats of dance music are drawing them in. Kewitz smiles and sips a Peroni beer, pleased at the bar's successful formula.

In his quest to be every bar for everybody, he has lined up a combination that will probably please anyone who walks in. That means change is a constant at the Innjoy.

To achieve that, he's painted the walls a more subdued color. They are now an earthy yellow instead of a key-lime green. He has also changed the chairs and booths to accommodate different crowds. A series of
